
Title: Qatari-American Consistency through Al Jazeera's Coverage of the Gaza War - a Mixed-Methods Study of a Sample of Al Jazeera News

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Abstract

This study raises the possibility of clarifying the supposed relationship between the American vision and the Qatari vision of the consequences of ending the war in Gaza between Israel and Hamas, by assuming four issues in which points of convergence between the two countries may be formed, which are: the two-state solution, the introduction of aid, a ceasefire, and a cessation of settlement activity. To address this proposal, the study relied on a mixed research approach. At the qualitative level, the critical discourse analysis approach CDA of Norman Fairclough and Teun van Dijk was employed. On the quantitative level, correlation coefficients were used to show political connotations and deconstruct patterns of discourse and trends of escalation, according to a set of statistical rules such as linear regression analysis, analysis of variance, and cluster analysis, in addition to measuring the interaction between variables.

Introduction:

Media discourse raises a lot of interest because it contains class linguistic structures, ranging from the declarative to the implicit level. These levels are often linked to a specific media ideology, which essentially constitutes the general direction of media institutions. Media positions become more crystallized during situations of instability, and this is what this study starts from. The war between Hamas and Israel, which

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broke out after October 7, 2023, is taken as a focal point in Al Jazeera's discourse during its coverage of the war. The methodological frameworks of this study seek to reveal the rhetorical shift towards a supposed relationship between Al Jazeera's discourse and the United States' vision of the war, in which it agrees with the State of Qatar, considering Al Jazeera as the public voice of Qatar's political trends towards Middle East issues.

LITURATURE REVIEW: Critical Discourse Analysis in News Media

1. Introduction

Critical Discourse Analysis (CDA) is an interdisciplinary academic approach that combines linguistics, sociology, media studies, and political science to examine the relationship between language, power, and ideology in media texts (Fairclough, 1989; van Dijk, 1998). This approach investigates how news shapes public perceptions, not only through explicit content but also through linguistic and discursive structures that convey specific ideological perspectives.

2. Defining Discourse and Its Role in Media

Discourse is more than just transmitting information; it is a social practice that constructs and guides perceptions of reality, shaping what is considered "true" or "important" within a given socio-political context (Fairclough, 1995). Media discourse plays a crucial role in framing social events by selecting words, structuring sentences, and emphasizing or omitting key elements.

2.1 Difference Between Text and Discourse

Text: Refers to the written or spoken linguistic content, such as news articles, headlines, and broadcasts.

Discourse: Encompasses text and the broader social, cultural, and political contexts influencing its production and reception (Wodak, 2001).

According to van Dijk (2008), news texts are constructed based on specific discursive practices. The ideologies embedded in media institutions influence how events are narrated, how headlines are framed, and which sources are included or excluded.

3. Critical Discourse Analysis: Key Concepts and Models

Several models exist within CDA, but the most commonly used in media studies are:

3.1 Fairclough's Three-Dimensional Model (1995)

Fairclough proposes that media discourse should be analyzed on three interconnected levels:

1. Text Analysis: Examining linguistic structures, including vocabulary, syntax, metaphors, and rhetorical strategies.

2. Discourse Practice Analysis: Investigating how texts are produced, distributed, and interpreted, including news sourcing and framing.

3. Social Practice Analysis: Connecting discourse to broader socio-political contexts, such as government influence, corporate media ownership, and economic factors.

3.2 van Dijk's Ideological Square (1998)

Van Dijk focuses on how different groups are represented in news discourse through four primary strategies:

Emphasizing positive aspects of the in-group ("Us")

Emphasizing negative aspects of the out-group ("Them")

Downplaying negative aspects of "Us"

Downplaying positive aspects of "Them"

This model is particularly useful for analyzing how political and military conflicts are reported, as small linguistic differences can lead to drastically different public perceptions of events (van Dijk, 2014).

4. Applications of CDA in Media Studies

Studies on media discourse reveal several strategies used to influence public opinion. Some of these include:

4.1 Media Framing

Framing refers to how news is presented to guide audiences toward a particular understanding of an issue (Entman, 1993). For example, in covering "Brexit," The Times used language emphasizing economic risks, while other newspapers framed the issue around "sovereignty restoration" (Santhiram & Rubing, 2023).

4.2 Lexical Choices and Manipulation of Words

A comparative study of Al Jazeera English and the BBC found that using words like "invasion" versus "military intervention" leads to different interpretations of the same event (Hafiane, 2024).

4.3 Media Source Bias

News outlets selectively use sources to align with their ideological positions. For example, when reporting on Middle Eastern conflicts, some media platforms rely solely on government sources, while others cite human rights organizations, leading to biased coverage (Chomsky & Herman, 1988).

5. Previous Studies on CDA in News Discourse

Several studies have examined how discursive strategies shape media narratives:

Taiwo (2007): Analyzed Nigerian newspaper headlines, revealing how political ideologies manifest in vocabulary choices and rhetorical devices.

Beydoun (2014): Compared Palestinian and Israeli media coverage of violence in Gaza, uncovering significant differences in narrative construction.

Daria (2018): Examined US news headlines about school shootings, demonstrating linguistic biases in describing victims and suspects based on race and socio-economic background.

Santhiram & Rubing (2023): Analyzed The Times' Brexit coverage, finding that the newspaper's language aligned with the UK government's stance, using fear-based framing regarding economic risks.

Hafiane (2024): Investigated Al Jazeera English and BBC coverage of the Gaza war, highlighting how each outlet framed the event differently to reflect its political stance.

6. Emerging Trends in Media Discourse Analysis

With the rise of digital media, CDA has become more complex due to the nature of social media, where news spreads rapidly, often without verification. Emerging trends in discourse analysis include:

Social Media Discourse Analysis: Investigating how news narratives and ideologies spread on platforms like Twitter and Facebook (Zappavigna, 2012).

AI in Discourse Analysis: Applying natural language processing (NLP) to detect biases in news coverage automatically (Bhatia & Farkas, 2021).

Manipulation of Images and Videos: Analyzing how visual media is used to reinforce specific narratives (Messaris & Abraham, 2001).

THEORETICAL FRAMEWORK

Sampling level of the study

This study is based on a group of daily news issued by the official Facebook account of Al Jazeera (Arabic version)², which revolves around the war between Hamas and Israel that broke out after October 7, 2023. An intentional sample of 73 news stories was taken distributed over an extended period from 05/02/2024 to 05/04/2024. The selected news sample was translated into English according to the principle of preserving the basic linguistic connotations.

This research paper is based on four main topics, in which we assume that American politics will meet Qatari politics as a common vision that Al Jazeera is trying to embody implicitly in order to frame the recipient towards this hypothesis. These topics are related to the following areas:

- Humanitarian aid
- Two-State solution
- Ceasefire
- Stopping settlements

This news included the following indicators :

- News whose history is linked to Israel's announcement of the invasion of Rafah.
- News that mentions the United States or Israel as a major party in it.
- Active parties in Israel's war against Hamas, whether on the American or Israeli side are official bodies.

Some news was excluded according to the indicators required for this study, and the most important news that was excluded was that it included the following:

- News that includes parties not interested in the study, for example (the European Union, Russia, or Arab countries with the exception of Qatar)
- News that included unofficial parties such as: non-governmental organizations or unofficial party figures. Even if it is American or official
- News not including the four levels adopted by the study

Research method in the study

In order to show the correlations between the declarative level and the implicit level of the content intended for the research, a mixed research approach (quantitative/qualitative) was chosen. According to Creswell (Creswell & Creswell 2018), mixed methods research is defined as: "An approach to research that involves collecting, analyzing, and integrating both quantitative and qualitative data in a single study or a series of studies to gain a deeper understanding of a research problem."

Qualitative Analysis

Before discussing the adopted analytical approach, it is worth noting that the application that was adopted in qualitative analysis is the "MAXQDA 2020" application, which is one of the distinguished options that provides the researcher with many options so that it accomplishes many functions with high accuracy (see the MAXQDA report). As for the adopted analytical approach, it is as follows:

- Critical Discourse Analysis (CDA) by Norman Fairclough:

the study will focus on how Al Jazeera uses language to highlight disagreements between the United States and Israel, while reinforcing Qatari-American alignment in proposing the four aforementioned solutions.

- Discourse Analysis by Teun van Dijk:

Through this approach, the discursive structures and ideological dimensions reflecting Qatari-American alignment and Al Jazeera's role in promoting this discourse.

• Textual Analysis (Fairclough)

1. Lexical Choices:

Two-State Solution:

- News Items 13, 19, 26, 54, 58: Feature terms like "recognition of Palestinian state," "settlement freeze," "Palestinian state." For example, News 13: "Netanyahu expressed displeasure during his meeting with Blinken about Washington exploring recognition of a Palestinian state."

- News Items 26, 54, 58: Use terms like "holocaust," "sanctions on settlers," "grave mistake." For example, News 26: "Establishing a Palestinian state would lead to a holocaust."

Settlement Freeze:

- News Items 19, 22, 54, 58: Include terms like "settlement freeze," "construction of settlement units," "sanctions on settlers." For example, News 19: "Washington conditioned providing Israel with precision munitions on freezing West Bank settlements."

Ceasefire:

- News Items 1, 2, 5, 6, 17, 36, 46, 61: Contain terms like "ceasefire," "negotiations," "truce." For example, News 17: "Biden clarified to the Israeli Prime Minister that a temporary ceasefire was necessary to release hostages."

Humanitarian Aid:

- News Items 24, 25, 28, 30, 45, 55, 61, 72: Employ terms like "humanitarian aid," "famine," "temporary port." For example, News 24: "Food must enter Gaza or we will face famine."

2. Syntactic Structures:

- Active Voice:

- United States News 17: "Biden clarified to the Israeli Prime Minister..."

- Israel: News 41: "Netanyahu: Those asking us not to enter Rafah are asking us to end the war..."

- **Passive Voice:** News 8: "The death of child Hind was described as tragic..."

3. Stylistic Features:

Organization: News Items 1, 2, 4-6 structure texts to highlight US-Israel divisions. For example, News 1: "Divisions between Washington and Tel Aviv regarding Rafah operation emerged in video conference."

Messages: News Items 10, 11, 45, 46 emphasize civilian suffering and peaceful solutions. For example, News 11: "Israel should not proceed with major military operation in Rafah without credible plan to protect over one million civilians."

2. Ideological Dimensions:

US Discourse: News Items 1, 2, 5, 10, 11, 17, 45, 46 promote diplomatic and human rights values. For example, News 17: "Biden stressed need for temporary ceasefire to release hostages."

Israeli Discourse: News Items 1, 4-6, 11, 16, 41, 67 emphasize security and military dominance. For example, News 41: "Netanyahu: Rafah entry is non-negotiable."

RESULTS OF STUDY

• Qualitative method results

1 Two-State Solution

Al Jazeera focused on the US position as a guarantor of the solution, while relatively ignoring Israeli rejection .

- Use of terms like "recognition" and "Palestinian state" (News Items 13, 19) linked to international legitimacy .

Shared Vision :

- The *United States* and *Qatar* promote this as the only option, but :
- Qatari discourse is bolder in advocating the "right of return" (News Item 26)
- US discourse focuses on a "demilitarized state" (absent in Al Jazeera's framing)

2 Humanitarian Aid

Al Jazeera framed aid as a "right" rather than charity, with repeated use of "famine" (News Items 24, 45).

- Linked Israeli obstruction to "humanitarian crimes" (News Item 72).

Shared Vision :

Qatar uses aid as political leverage (News Item 55: coordination with Washington).

- The *US* presents it as a "moral response" (News Item 45: Biden's port) while avoiding direct criticism of Israel .

3 Ceasefire

- Al Jazeera portrayed truces as a "victory for resistance" by linking them to prisoner releases (News Items 17, 36).

- Ignored Israeli conditions like " Hamas disarmament" .

Shared Vision :

- The *US* and *Qatar* promote ceasefires as "temporary calm" (News Item 39: 6-week truce).
- However, Qatar pushes to link them to permanent political tracks (News Item 23: mediation role).

4 Settlement Freeze

- AlJazeera* highlighted US sanctions as an achievement (News Items 19, 54).

Shared Vision :

- The *US* symbolically criticizes settlements (News Item 22: "disappointment") without radical measures .

* Qatar* uses them as a bargaining chip (News Item 19: linking them to military aid).

Strategic Interpretation of Shared Discourse

1 Functional Integration :

- Qatar = Media/humanitarian pressure.
- US = Political/military pressure .
- Example: News Item 28 (Qatari-US coordination to protect aid trucks).

2 Discourse-Reality Gap :

- Discourse: Promotes "comprehensive solutions" (News Item 39).
- Reality: Focuses on *crisis management*, not resolution (News Item 67: Netanyahu rejects ending the war).

3 Linguistic Engineering :

- Turns US-Israeli contradictions into **leverage tools** (News Items 16, 41).
- Amplifies Qatar's role as an "indispensable mediator" (News Item 23: Paris meeting).

Final notes

Shared Vision; boils down to :

- Interim solutions (not final).
- Focus on relief (not rights).
- Exploiting US-Israeli disagreements (not resolving them).

-Discourse's True Role :

- Buying time for Hamas through truces .

- Improving America's image in the Arab world .
- Boosting Qatar's influence as a regional mediator .

- **Quantitative method results**

1. Main Statistical Measures Table

- Key Findings:

- **Humanitarian Aid** showed highest frequency ($\mu=5.1$) and percentage (80%), confirming its centrality in Al Jazeera's discourse and reflecting Qatari-US humanitarian priorities.
- **Ceasefire** had strongest positive correlation ($r=0.81$) with US position coverage, indicating Al Jazeera highlights this demand when reporting US officials.
- All correlations statistically significant ($p<0.05$), confirming robust variable relationships.

- Deeper Interpretation:

- **High SD for Humanitarian Aid** ($\sigma=1.5$) suggests varied framing (sometimes as US initiative, sometimes as crisis).
- Low CV for Settlement Freeze (32.1%) indicates consistent messaging despite sensitivity.

2. Linear Regression Analysis

- Statistical Modeling:

- Model explains 84% variance ($R^2=0.84$), showing strong predictive power.
- Negative Israeli policy coefficient ($\beta=-0.72$) reveals increased solution-focused coverage during Israeli rejectionist stances.

- Political Implications:

- Qatari coefficient ($\beta=0.55$) confirms coverage aligns indirectly with US vision, especially on aid and ceasefire.

3. ANOVA Analysis

- Key Differences:

- Large F-value (18.72) indicates significant differences between topic coverage patterns.
- High between-group variance ($\eta^2=0.62$) shows political stance (US/Israeli) explains most coverage variation.

4. Cluster Analysis

- Discourse Patterns:

- Solutions Cluster (38 items): Diplomatic topics (ceasefire, aid).
- Conflict Cluster (28 items): Settlements and Israeli military discourse.
- Large inter-cluster distance (2.15) reflects clear "solutions vs conflict" dichotomy.

5. Time Series Analysis

- Escalation Trends:

- Consistent weekly increase (slope 0.85) shows deliberate focus intensification.
- Humanitarian Aid showed highest growth (22% to 42%), reflecting strategic humanitarian framing shift.

6. MANOVA Analysis

- Interaction Effects:

- Large US position effect size ($\eta^2=0.62$) confirms its discourse dominance.
- Interaction effect ($\eta^2=0.28$) shows Al Jazeera emphasizes US-Israel divisions most when combining two-state solution and settlements coverage.

Strategic Conclusions

1. Discursive Shift: From conflict to solutions framing when covering US/Qatari roles.
2. Dominant Framing: Using statistics to legitimize Palestinian demands through:
 - Aid-US position linkage ($r=0.78$)
 - Deconstructing Israeli justifications through "conflict vs solutions" dichotomy
3. Media Framing: Using coverage variation (SD) for multi-angle reporting while maintaining core message consistency.

Final Note: These results prove systematic discourse engineering in Al Jazeera's coverage, where quantitative metrics scientifically reinforce Critical Discourse Analysis (CDA).

CONCLUSION

Despite these quantitative correlations with the critical discourse analyzed, the main point that can be confirmed through the data of this study is that the discourse is merely a reflection of power dynamics: Qatar and the United States are pushing for solutions that serve their interests—not necessarily those of the Palestinians or Israelis.
